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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Arts & Science College, Pulgaon established by Mahila Vikas Sanstha, Wardha in the year 1994 is one of the premier educational institutions in Deoli Tehsil, Dist. Wardha, Maharashtra. The institution is located in rural area with 2 acres of lush green campus, imparting quality co-education in the faculties of Arts, Science and Commerce. In fact, it is the only institution in Deoli Tehsil providing higher education in Science stream. Ever since its inception the College has made its imprint in imparting quality education to the rural students.

It is a grant-in-aid institution affiliated to RTM Nagpur University and it received permanent affiliation in the year 2003. The U.G.C. has accorded status of 2(f) and 12 (b) to the college.

Out of 25 faculties of the college, 15 faculty members are Ph. D. holders and 08 faculty members are Research Guides. The college promotes and motivates the faculties for research and publication activities. The faculties of college have to their credit about 200 different publications during last five years. The college is also active in community and extension services through NSS unit. The college feels proud to mention here that it has adopted Nachangaon village other than NSS.

The college volunteered itself to be assessed and accredited with 'B' Grade CGPA 2.36 score by NAAC, (Cycle-I).

IQAC has been established in the college on 28/02/2013. Accordingly every activity is monitored and performed through action plan prepared by IQAC at the beginning of every session and action taken report is prepared.

- The institution being located in rural and industrially backward area, placement activities are difficult to conduct effectively.
- Being a rural based college, most of the students are scared and apprehensive about English and therefore English Communication Gap.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institution has a clear goal and objective of enhancing students' capability through effective teachinglearning methods and their overall development. The goal and objective is given prominent place during academic planning. The vision, mission and objectives of the institution are clearly stated and communicated through prospectus, college website and various means of publicity.

Being an affiliated college we follow the syllabi prescribed by the university. The institute does not have any flexibility in curriculum other than what is framed and approved by the University under which it is affiliated. For effective implementation of the curriculum, academic calendar and monthly teaching plan are prepared in the beginning of the session based on the Academic Calendar of affiliating university; efforts are made to give full justice to the same.

Curriculum is updated from time to time by concerned University keeping in view the latest trend and currents in the academic arena. Innovative ideas and experimental methods are used as the best practices in curricular aspects. Teachers and students are encouraged to invent and suggest qualitative methods to impart quality education and improve general academic teaching.

Teachers are sent to attend orientation and refresher courses, seminar, workshops and conferences for improving teaching practices, curriculum enrichment and up-gradation of subject knowledge.

All stakeholders including students are counseled to express their opinions freely and without any hesitation in form of Feedback Forms and the same are analyzed and used to enhance the learning effectiveness.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching-learning and evaluation is given great importance. The admission process is transparent and well adopted. Various academic needs of the students are looked into for their career enhancement. Teaching-learning methods are conducive to quality teaching and apart from that through use of ICT students are encouraged to attend the courses regularly. Survey and test evaluation is carried out and reformative action is initiated. The institution follows the best teaching methods.

For a better teaching-learning experience three ICT enabled Digital Rooms are provided in the college where every faculty uses it regularly. The college provides counseling and guidance to the students especially to the underprivileged community, girls and students from economically weaker sections of society. The institution has adopted strategies such as providing internet service, reference books as additional facilities to the advanced learners and remedial coaching for slow learners. Enough scope and weightage is given to co-curricular and extension activities. The college provides other learning experiences such as assignments, projects, group discussions, seminars, CoPs and short term certificate courses etc. Visits to industries and educational tours are also arranged.

The college makes use of e-resources such as Interactive Board, Computers, and Internet etc. apart from class room interactions and laboratory instruments. Some departments are provided with Computers and Departmental Library. The institution has a well-conceived plan for monitoring students' progress and continuous evaluation through mentor-mentee scheme, tests and examinations, result analysis, etc. All activities are monitored by IQAC.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institution has promoted research activities. Teachers are encouraged to promote research and publish it, in fact 15 faculties out of 25 have obtained their Ph.D. and remaining faculties are pursuing their Ph.Ds. Some faculty members are Research Guides and are actively engaged in research activities.

The college provides and facilitates all possible resources to promote research culture amongst the faculty and students. Faculty is encouraged to attend seminars, workshops and activities related to research. Teachers' participation in research courses, seminars and workshops held has continuously increased. The college can boast of some good quality minor and major research projects so far 9 MRPs completed and 3 are ongoing. All the faculties have published large number of research articles in proceedings and reputed journals and few books. Publication of *ASC Faculty Research Book* has been initiated from the session 2016-17. Students are motivated for research through field works, assignments, projects, institutional and industrial visits etc.

The college runs a number of Extension activities such as N.S.S. unit, Lifelong Education and Extension Programme, Women Study Centre (*Mahila Adhyayan Kendra*), Population Education Centre, Green Waves Natures Club, etc. Students associated with these activities undertake extension activities while others join them as and when needed. The institution has developed an ecosystem for innovations including knowledge centre for creation and transfer of knowledge. The institution works with a number of collaboration with other institutions, government and non-government organizations, industries and has signed as much as 9 MoUs after post accreditation.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college runs on its own spacious and beautiful 2 acres of campus with all basic amenities required for

serious academic pursuit with built up area about 4460.27 Sq. mt. It has a very good Library and sophisticated Laboratories. It has ICT enabled specious seminar hall. It provides both indoor and outdoor games and sports facilities with maintained ground and gymnasium. It is provided with medicinal and botanical garden.

In recent years college has developed considerable ICT facilities, it has as much as one hundred computers in working condition. It has fully developed Central Computer Laboratory and networking system and these facilities are easily available to students and faculty members for academic use.

The Library is used as a great learning source. It has a good collection of books, journals and magazines on all subjects along with e-resources such as e-journals and e-books, students are encouraged to visit it regularly. It provides facilities like open access, separate section for preparation of competitive exams, specious reading room etc. Library is fully computerized runs on LIBSOFT, it is provided with seven computers and internet facility. The institution has made provisions for e-services facility through N-List and INFLIBINET. The college has its own website. The college has been developing the infrastructure and learning resources as per the need of academic growth, as per valuable suggestion from parents, managing body and other stake-holders.

Student Support and Progression

Proper utilization of human resources, staff recruitment and monitoring system is adopted to activate planning. The Principal is the executive and academic head of the college. He is responsible for admission, discipline,

development and maintenance of accounts along with the management of the library and correspondence. The IQAC, Head of the Departments and college staff members through different duly constituted committees render their services to impart quality to its various administrative and academic units. Thus decision making process is decentralized. The faculty is also involved in decision making through their involvement in LMC and various academic and administrative committees.

The institution has an effective internal co-ordination and monitoring mechanism with IQAC for quality control through academic audit, campus monitoring, college examination, feedback and academic planning. The prospective plan of development is made after consultation with the Heads and Local Managing Committee by the IQAC in this order.

The institution always ensures effective curriculum delivery. - By forming various committees of staff for different activities i.e. admission committee, student counseling committee, time table committee, examination committee, library committee, research & publication committee etc.
- By preparing college time-table and subject wise digital time-table.
- To provide the academic diaries at the very beginning of the session to the faculty is a regular practice.
- Assignment of Class wise Teacher-Guardian responsibilities.

The institution implements the action plan of the curriculum effectively in the following way:

- Assign the workload to the individual faculty by their HODs as per regulations.
- Evaluation of students through unit tests, surprise tests, terminal and annual test examination.
- Assessment of practical records and Internal Assignments, home assignments and projects.
- Online quiz test on "Moodlecloud.com" website.
- Virtual lectures from experts.
- Feedback from students.

For effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices

- Most of the departments have their own computers with internet connectivity.
- College have three digital class rooms and every teacher uses ICT for making teaching learning process effective.

- Teachers frame a teaching plan according to the given framework of time, and proceed for the implementation of curriculum accordingly using their teacher's diary.
- Unit tests, surprise tests and tests for internal assessment and terminal examinations for continuous evaluation.
- Most of the departments organize Group Discussions, seminars, Guest lectures, compilation and reading of scrap books etc.
- The Institution provides Free Wi-fi facility to students for accessing Educational Websites to improve their performance.
- The college also motivates the students to bring out various issues on wall papers and in departmental scrap books.
- Number of books and research journals are available in the Central Library and Departmental Libraries. The students can search their books and availability in the library by using LIBSOFT.
- The Library has Internet connectivity with 07 Computers for accessing e-content for students and staff.

Response:

The institute has extremely proactive student forums such as Science Study Forums, Language Study Forum, Social Science Study Forum, Commerce Study Forum, Green Waves Natures Club etc. that helps in creating awareness regarding social issues such as gender, environmental awareness and human values and professional ethics through the following activities:

Gender

As institution is running by Mahila Vikas Sanstha Wardha, it has laid strong emphasis on gender equality and equal opportunity for girls as the percentage of female student is higher than male. The institution conducts talks and lectures, workshops, training, poster exhibitions on Save Girl Child and Street acts on gender issues which are more or less covered under curriculum prescribed for its students. Besides, language subjects usually contain essays, short stories, plays and poems on these issues in their syllabus. This is often used as an opportunity to spark an interaction, debate, group discussion in the classroom. These issues are also discussed through doctors and social activists along with the general health issues of girls and marriage counselling, sex education etc. Apart from IQAC has initiated 'Bold is Beautiful Campaign' through flex and boards of higher achievements by women to inspire girl students.

Environment and Sustainability

The University has assigned Environmental Studies as a compulsory subject for the students of third and fourth semester of each faculty. Although it does not affect their percentage, students' results are withheld until they clear the subject. The institution takes this very seriously and has assigned this duty to a specific faculty. The subject of Geography covers many issues related to environment and sustainability. Environmental awareness is also created through submission of aassignments and projects on rough papers, pamphlets, used papers etc. At the same time some short term course associated with this are initiated. It has specious botanical and medicinal plant garden, it also conducts green audit. IQAC formed common platform known as 'Green Waves Natures Club' through which various activities related to Environment and sustainability are conducted such as celebration of national and international Days, Science Day, guest lectures on Environment Awareness.

Human Values and Professional Ethics

Human Values and Professional Ethics as specifically is not separately taught, however it has been covered under various subjects such as the lives and principles taught by saints, philosophers, thinkers and critics. Awareness about the same is created by conducting talks and lectures, Seminars and Conferences. Celebration of important National and International days to inculcate human values like Human Right Day, Constitutional Day, Youth Day and birth and death anniversaries of National Heroes. Separate collection of books on thinkers prescribed for curriculum is provided in library.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

There is a provision for testing the skill of the students before admitting to a course at the time of counseling. The candidate's aptitude and attitude is checked before admitting to the course at the time of counseling before admissions. In the initial two-three days the students are made aware about the introduction of subjects, terms, phrases etc. they opted for. Subject teachers during the course of regular teaching identify such slow and advanced learners through classroom level interaction and through unit tests.

For Slow Learners

Slow learners are given maximum thrust through tutorials, discussion, interaction and Remedial Coaching and advanced learners are encouraged to put in more efforts for higher result. The institution has Teacher –Guardian Scheme i.e. each faculty member takes care of about 10 to15 students per year.

These slow learners and the ones at the risk of drop out are specially counseled by the Mentor-Teachers in the mentoring system. They are counseled and guided to particular in remedial coaching and tutorials conduct for them. The Mentor-Teachers continuously overlook about their progress and motivate them to put in extra efforts to achieve more in academics. Special classes are conducted whenever necessary for difficult topics. The English, Physics and Maths departments conduct special tutorials for such students. Teachers call these students especially after classes to solve their difficulties. Students are given additional notes by teachers and practice tests are conducted for such students. Special coaching for improvement of English language and communication skills are provided and students are encouraged to participate in the personality development classes conduct free of cost by college.

For Advanced Learners

Advanced learners are identified and given extra books of references from the central library, they are also encouraged to take up independent learning by research, special assignments and participation in academic competitions, seminars in and outside of college. They are counseled and given guidance to appear in competitive exams like NET, SET, GATE, JAM, MPSC, UPSC etc. Such students are motivated to participate in projects presentation and involved in research projects by Science and Arts department and also sent to visit Research Institute. The Mentor-Teachers give them special counseling regarding merit scholarship and carrier opportunities that are based on higher learning abilities. They are also given problems that involve their higher problem solving capacities. The Carrier Counseling and Guidance Cell inspire them to attend Campus training and interviews at sister institute for job placement.

These students are also encouraged to participate in NSS, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for all round development. Faculties in the college give special attention toward these students and keep a dialogue with them and provide all possible help in better learning in and off classroom situations.

These students are given various responsibilities under various Subjects Study Circles which give them exposure and inculcate in them sense accountability and leadership qualities.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

Learning is focused on students' activities and task which always strive to be student centric. Most of the students in our Institute belonged to the socio-economically weaker sections of the society and many of them are first generation learners so they are totally dependent on college for learning facilities. Keeping

this in mind College always introduces various facilities and support structure for students.

Experimental Learning

- Every department has their own study circles which give ample opportunity to students for learning.
- Each department amply uses ICT based teaching-learning process as per digital room time table to give more exposure to students to the field of knowledge and to experience modern learning process.
- Guest lectures and workshop for direct interactions and solving student's queries is a regular practice.
- Every department has their own method of identifying slow learners, according extra and remedial classes provided for them.
- Teachers prepare question banks and help students preparing answers for the respective subjects.
- Some departments of UG Final year students are given assignments and project work and later they present it in the classroom level seminar to develop research aptitude.
- Students get direct exposure to life like situational learning through field work.
- To develop literary and aesthetic bent college annually publishes *Antarnad* Magazine. At the same time facility of *College Katta* wall magazine is provided.
- Through NSS and departmental extension activities students get opportunity to learn the social structure and develop their knowledge about social-environmental issues.
- Cultural and sports departments organize college level and inter-collegiate level events to prepare students for competitive events.

Participating Learning

- Teachers conduct interactive session with students and ask them question on the topic.
- Brain Activity is a regular feature of all the departments where students are given a topic, concept, article from books to read. This is then analyzed, discussed and reviewed in class.
- The senior students are encouraged to present and teach some topic under teacher supervision.
- Alumni of college are invited to deliver talks and to interact with students on certain topics in the curriculum.

Problem Solving Methodologies

- Hands on training, Group discussion, Quiz contests, practical training and experiments in groups, practice of one hour learning and Answer daily, an innovative practice problem Corner are some of the problem solving methods to develop analytical abilities and to overcome the fearless of exams and studies among students.
- Class seminars along with presentation and expression skills by way of Power Point Presentation.
- Study tours, Industrial and field visits are regular feature of Institution.
- Students of final year and PG students are encouraged to prepare Research Papers on the allotted syllabus and present the same in class seminar thereby developing their Research and Presentation Skills.
- Students are advised and motivated to watch educative TV channels like National Geographic, FOX, History, BBC, Discovery, Epic and other News channels during their free time.
- Short term and soft skill courses are regular practice of IQAC.

2.3.4 Innovation and creativity in teaching-learning

Response:

The intellectual stimuli to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students is provided through a multi-prolonged learning, Demonstration method, Students seminar, Guest Lectures, Workshops, College Magazine and Wall Paper. The goal is to create future citizens who are life-long learners and innovators.

Creativity in the student is podded, nurtured and allowed to concretize itself into scientific thoughts, views and innovation through the multifarious activities conducted by subject based arts and science societies.

- Interactive method of teaching and learning is adopted in the Institution as each stream is provided with digital rooms.
- A Seminar Hall equipped with audio visual system and projector is used for special and guest lectures.
- Most of the departments are provided Computers with internet facility and a free Wi-Fi facility for teachers and students is also available.
- Class seminars on pre allotted topics of their choice foster the formation of scientific views and opinion and frequency of teaching and grasping level to student get matched.
- Quizzing session in class promote quick thinking and memory sharpening skills.
- Participation of students in process of scientific research which gives them the satisfaction of

arriving at new discovered and scientific conclusion.

- Poster presentation by students in the subject of science contextual theoretical knowledge with realities of situations and scientific results.
- Power point presentation allowed students the freedom of researching topics and presenting on different platforms
- The traditional method of teaching through lecture method is molded and made innovative by the use of ICT for better understanding of the concerned subject.
- 03 digital classrooms with LCD Projectors and interactive boards are available in the institution.

Other than ICT based teaching more emphasize is given to traditional method of teaching through which critical thinking is nurtured through different methods and activities such as Guest Lectures and Faculty Exchange programme for some topics, Brain Activity, Group Discussion, Problem Solving, Role play, Paper Presentation, Class Seminar, Peer and Alumni Talks, Exhibitions, Field visit, study tours which transform the students into lifelong innovators.

Creativity is hidden talent within the personality of every students and the college evokes this gold mine of creativity and polishes it to finesse by giving varied number of platforms to the student.

- Students are encouraged to participate in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and competitions under the banner '*Abhinav Kala Manch*'.
- In order to create skill development among the students charkha training, short term courses, value based education, assignments and projects on rough, used papers and pamphlets, '*Pragati-Vastra pradarshani*' and exhibitions organized by various departments.
- Department of Home Economics facilitates nutritional food week through students on no loss no profit base to create awareness about nutrition value in food.
- Literary talents of students are allowed to flower and appear in college magazine '*Antarnad*' and students corner '*College Katta*'.
- Scrap books are prepared by the student of different departments in which a subject related articles, information collected by students from newspapers and magazines.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

Internal Quality Assurance Cell has been established in the college and every activity is monitored through it. As a continuous internal evaluation, the college has taken many measures to enhance the quality of higher education. The institution has taken many initiatives in post-accreditation period to enhance quality of higher education. The Annual Programme Plan chalked out at the end of each academic session by every department set out the plan of evaluation process which is communicated to the IQAC and the same is included into the academic calendar for the next session.

- At the beginning of the academic session, every department conducts an orientation programme in which the plan of evaluation process is informed to the students.
- The tentative time and dates of the Unit Test and other exams are also communicated through the Notice Boards and oral intimation.

University Initiated Reforms

The RTM Nagpur University has made certain major reforms in the evaluation pattern and the same has been fully adopted by the Institution.

- Introduction of semester pattern for all PG courses from 2012-13 and for all UG courses in science stream from 2013-14 and all other streams from 2015-16.
- Scheme of University incentive marks is adopted.
- University has introduced online valuation for UG Science courses from the academic year 2015-16.

College Initiated Reforms

The college has initiated certain reforms to keep pace with the university pattern to make the teachinglearning process more effective.

• All departments adhere academic calendar and execute the unit tests and college exams, sessional plan accordingly.

- Practice tests of short answer question, Surprise tests and open book tests in few subjects are conducted.
- Regular Practice of preparing research papers and present the same in class seminar for PG Course.
- Project submission, presentation and PPT in all subjects are unique evaluation process that also tests the applied knowledge in a subject.

The evaluation reforms and approaches introduced by the institution are tackled in the following way.

- The plan of unit test and college exam set out by the teachers of the concerned departments is meticulously followed.
- Tests and examinations are planned and hence notified in advanced to students.
- The departments prepare Question Banks in every subject.
- Practice Tests, MCQ tests and Moodlecloude.com an online test are a routine for preparing students for examination.
- Talks on how to prepare for University Examination is also a distinct feature.
- Exercise of solving University Old Question Papers under the guidance of teachers.
- Internal Assessment of students is a continuous process and the parameters of the same are notified in advance to the students. Results of the same are conveyed to the parents.
- Practicals are conducted as per the University schedule.
- Seminar presentation and viva voce whenever necessary are conducted to evaluate students.
- Each faculty member here is considered as mentee to a group of students.
- Submission of internal assessment record is a continuous process to evaluate student performance.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

Response:

Mechanism of internal assessment for the improvement of students performance and quality of teaching-learning is monitored and evaluated in a structural fashion by Principal, IQAC, Teachers themselves, Students and Parents Feedback.

A step by step internal assessment is transparent and robust for effective teaching-learning process and overall development of students is made by the institution by using following tools.

- **Teachers Daily Diary** The daily diary maintained by the teachers is a tool for the teacher about course coverage and completion. The Principal also verifies the daily diary periodically while signing it.
- Academic Audit The Annual Academic Audit conducted by the IQAC and the Principal monitors, reviews and evaluates the teaching-learning process after which appropriate suggestions are given to bring about changes in teaching methods and approaches.
- **Students Feedback** The student feedback forms are analysed and conveyed to the principal who then talks to the concerned teacher with the suggestions and comments in the student feedback.
- **Self-Appraisal** Review of self-appraisal and PBAS form is an important document for the professional development of teacher which will ultimately result into the holistic development of students.
- Parents-Teacher Meeting It is one of methods where teachers and parents interact to address

common concerns in internal assessment and evaluation results of their wards are convey to them.

• **Students Internal Assessment** - The students are apprised beforehand and especially at the time of Orientation about the internal evaluation process, the weightage given to different aspects in the process and the marks distribution for the same. The internal assessment parameters are chalked out about course and the programme. Illustrative cases on the point are internal evaluation parameters of UG and PG programmes as per University guidelines.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

The students are given liberty to raise examination related grievances to the Grievances Redressal committee. Such grievances then are looked into seriously and investigated. The students can approach directly or through suggestion box. This mechanism is independent to redress grievances if any with respect to examinations.

Grievance with regard to evaluation is dealt with two levels -

At College Level

Grievance regarding evaluation of College exams and Tests papers if any raised by students are welcomed, discussed and solved by the concerned subject teachers.

If the student has any grievance regarding internal assessment, the student is free to get his grievance redressed through the concerned teacher.

At University Level

Grievance regarding evaluation of University Examination has to be resolved independently by the students, but the institution has assigned this task to particular staff in order to save time and money of the grieved student.

- Grievance in respect of exam forms filling is dealt with by the concerned clerk and HOD.
- Grievance with regard to the examination Hall Ticket is dealt with by the concerned issuing clerk.
- Grievance in respect of exam, a name change, subject change in Hall ticket is dealt with exam Officer In charge and clerk.
- Grievance with respect to mark sheet and withheld results of students passes through the clerk and then a prescribed form forwarded to the University for the necessary changes.
- In case of University valued papers, the photocopy of the valued paper can be obtained paying the fee within stipulated time and the same discussed with concerned subject teacher after which a student submits the paper for revaluation to the University.
- The exam committee is constituted to take care of the complete mechanism of planning and implementing the evaluation process in the College.

2.5.4 The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE

Response:

The Institute has a systematic approach to develop and deploy action plans for the continuous internal evaluation not in terms of examination but from the point of view of overall performance of student. The evaluation of the students has become internal as well as an integral part of the teaching-learning process. The assessment of the students has taken into account a number of essential abilities to be developed among them such as National Integrity, Human Values, Moral Education, drive and capacity for hard work, quality of imagination, skilled use of hands, etc.

The IQAC prepares the academic calendar of the college in consonance with the academic calendar of University. Accordingly respective departments prepared their action plan. The deployment of the Action Plan is adhered as per academic calendar. There is therefore a confluence of both department and IQAC in the effective implementation of the continuous evaluation process.

Every faculty is provided with Teacher's Diary and Daily Notes into which they prepare entire record of the class and students assigned to them. It includes action plan, departmental-practical, digital room time

table, record of the results, monthly synopsis of teaching, tracking record of adopted students, record of unit tests, terminal exam, tutorial and assignment which make continuous assessment of students progression. Other than regular assessment few department conduct surprise tests, open book test, short questions and MCQs test to evaluate the students. The diaries are checked from time to time by the Principal, they are submitted to IQAC at the end of session with remarks.

Remedial Coaching classes for slow learners and student belonging to backward classes is a regular practice to bring them into mainstream of higher education. At the same time advance learner are boosted through mentor-mentee scheme and special guidance.

Students' skill and knowledge is also evaluated through Group discussion, class seminars. Guest lectures, workshops and seminars is a regular practice to enlightened students and to make them aware about current trends and topics in education.

Apart from traditional teaching-learning methods faculties make optimal use of ICT Teaching through which students are evaluated by various practices like power point presentation.

Other than core courses students can also opt for number of Short Term Courses offered by Institution, it is also one of the methods to evaluate students' learning capacity.

The performance of the students can also assessed through regular participation in Co-curricular, extracurricular activities and other competitions.

Feedback from students, parents, alumni and employers along with academic peer is also taken which helps in overcoming the difficulties faced by the institution in the process of continuous internal evaluation. The Institution always strives to adhere to the academic calendar and to bring positive changes and development for continuous internal evaluation.

In addition to this, all the key stakeholders are made familiar with programme outcomes, Program specific outcomes and course outcomes through Counseling at the time of admission, personal counseling throughout the year by faculties and counseling cell, faculty workshops, student workshops, fresher's programme for students, faculty meetings, parent-teacher interaction etc.

The Bachelor of Arts requires three Years of Full time study consisting six semesters. The Bachelor of Arts provides students with a broad range of disciplinary and interdisciplinary studies from across the University, with a strong focus on aspects of human culture and achievements in social and behavioral sciences. Arts degrees are focused on increasing a student's knowledge and critical thinking skills in a variety of areas – literature, history, political science, economics, fashion designing etc.

The Bachelor of Science requires three Years of Full time study consisting six semesters. It translates to making a significant investment in one's professional career. In addition to the enhanced career prospects that can be gained by opting it a students also develop valuable personal skills and fulfill a crucial prerequisite to Master studies. It concentrates on providing opportunities for students to show outstanding performance at subject knowledge and understanding, intellectual skills related to the subject, transferable skills and attitudes through introduction of a wide range of topics, reasoning through unfamiliar problems, critical and analytical thinking,

The Bachelor of Commerce requires three Years of Full time study consisting six semesters. It aims to provide students with the knowledge, tools of analysis and skills with which to understand and participate in the modern business and economic world, to prepare them for subsequent graduate studies and to achieve success in their professional careers. Demonstration of knowledge in major theories and models is key areas of organizational behavior. Demonstrate knowledge of macroeconomic and microeconomic theories. Application of basic mathematical and statistical skills. Graduates of this degree will be knowledgeable of domestic and international economic and organizational environments.

Master of Arts (Marathi)

The M. A. Programme is two years. It includes four semesters. It focuses on Research activities, Student Development and improves language skills and life skills. The Department through its research critiques and literary essays have generated methodological parameter and approaches and added to the existing knowledge in the subject of old and medieval literature, Modern Poetry, Contemporary Marathi Literature, New literary trends etc. Rare combination to academic and administrative excellence is a major strength of the Department. Being a State Language it helps students for various competitive examinations.

2.6.2 Attainment of program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution

Response:

The Institution regularly evaluates the performance of students through various methods for measuring the
attainment of each of the Program Outcomes, Program Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes.

Evaluation Process:

The programme outcomes and Programme Specific outcomes are assessed with the help of course outcomes of the relevant programme through direct and indirect evaluation process. Direct evaluation process is provided through University Examinations, terminal exams, internal and home assignments, unit tests, surprise tests, open book tests etc.

Throughout the year the faculty records the performance of each student on each programme outcome. Besides each faculty is assigned with mentor-mentee scheme under which specific number of students are provided with special guidance to assigned programme. At the same time remedial coaching is also provided to slow learners and economically backward classes students to make the pace with the desired progression.

Average attainment in Evaluation Process:

Students under university examination are evaluated for 50% to 80% of total marks and institution for 50% to 20% marks as internal and external assessment under semester pattern while students of annual pattern are evaluate for 100% marks by the concerned university.

Students enrolled for courses offered by institution are evaluated by the institution itself at the same time observations of student knowledge and skills against measurable course outcomes are evaluated throughout the year.

Indirect assessment continuously monitored through feedback from Student, Employer, Alumni and Parent which is collected, analyzed and necessary action is initiated.

According to the above, each Programme outcomes and Programme specific outcomes are assessed and finally found the attainments.

The Methods of measuring attainment:

1. Annual and End Semester University Examination

The affiliating University conducts examinations as per semester and annual pattern through which the institution measures programme outcomes based on the course attainment level fixed by the programme. It is a direct evaluation process.

2. Internal and External Assessment

Internal assignments are given to the students with the purpose that student will refer the text books and reference books to find out the best answers and understand the expected objectives of the given assignments. The assignments given are mostly aligned with Programme Outcome of the respective subject.

External Assessment is evaluated by external experts appointed by University through Viva-voce and practical record book.

3. Institutional Examination and Tests

Students are assessed and evaluated throughout the year at institutional level through unit test, surprise test, terminal examination and the performance of the student is analyzed for assessing the attainment level of programme outcomes and programme specific outcomes.

4. Feedback Evaluation

The Institution collects feedback from students, Alumni, Employers and Parents which is an important method of measuring attainment with objectives of identifying the attainment level of students in terms of programme, subject, course and syllabus outcomes and to understand the impact of teaching-learning process.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities in the neighbourhood community in terms of impact and sensitising students to social issues and holistic development during the last five years

Response:

The institution undertakes most of the extension activities which are immediately related to the specific requirement of the neighbourhood community through its students to impart and sensitize students to social issues and holistic development and to move social responsibility from theoretical foundation to practical. The Institute is well networked with its neighbourhood and promotes constant interaction which involves student participation. The college lends all support and encouragement to its students as it is evident from the description mentioned below in order to make them better citizens.

The Institute has accomplished number of projects through IQAC, NSS, Green Waves Natures Club, various departments and in collaboration with other Institutes, Associations, Government and Non-Government Organisations which directly help in community development.

- The Village has witnessed a **severe epidemic of Dengue**, in which **four children died**. The College in association with Rural Hospital, Pulgaon and Lions Club Pulgaon Bridge Town, made Social Awareness Campaign with the students of other Schools and colleges, who whole heartedly participated in this program through several Surveys and Awareness Rallies and cleaning of earthen and metal pots of nearby areas, making all people of the village aware about this situation.
- The Institution created awareness about importance of **Soil and Water Testing** to the local farmers and subsequently provided guidance to them for recent changes in cultivation.
- The college has collected Rs. 15000/- to be **donated to the Prime Minister National Relief Fund** through the students of the college and staff. The D.D. of the Rs. 15000/- handed over to the MP of Wardha Constituency.
- The Institution also recognized importance of *Extension Activities* with dual purpose of highlighting the popularity and creating Social and Environmental Awareness among students and faculties such as the Institution distributed free Orange Plants to students, the Institution initiated *Ek Mutthi Anaj* project by way of collecting grain from students and staff and donated to old age home for Women, the Institution distributed Cloths, fruits and sweets to Deaf and Dumb School, School Uniform to Anganwadi Students and clothes to New Born Baby at Rural Hospital, the Institution has adopted Nachangaon Village as institutional social responsibility for long term project other than NSS extension activity, Cleanliness drive, Collection of floral wastage(Nirmalya) at the time of Ganesh & Durga Festival. Such wastage Nirmalya is used for Lab to Land Project

Nirmalya to Fertilizer & Vermi Compost Project.

At the same time awareness about medical related issues, health and hygienic issues, environmental issues and current social issues are highlighted through extension activities wherein students are made aware of the various problems faced by the villagers and how can they contribute to the development of society.

Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The institution has adequate facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, etc.

Response:

The Institution runs on its own spacious and beautiful 2 acres of campus with all basic amenities required for serious academic pursuit with built up area about 4460.27 Sq. meter. The College has well - equipped seventeen classrooms with LED bulbs, fans and furniture including three digital classrooms with LCD projectors, interactive boards, audio- visual system and internet facility.

It has eleven sophisticated Laboratories. The departments of Home-Economics, Fashion Designing, and Geography have separate laboratories with adequate infrastructural facilities. The departments of Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, Biochemistry and Microbiology have a separate research labs with sophisticated equipments.

The Institution has more than 100 computers including fully developed Central Computer Laboratory and networking system and these facilities are easily available to students and faculty members for academic pursuit. Internet facilities are now available to all the departments, as college campus is now fully Wi-Fi enabled. The college has installed CCTV cameras.

The Institution has one seminar hall provided with E-classroom equipment, LCD Projector, audio system and internet to conduct conferences, seminars and workshops for students and faculty members as well.

The Institution is well equipped Central Library fully automated, having number of references and text books, journals, magazines, newspapers, e-resources including various departmental libraries.

The Institute provides basic and additional facilities as per the need of hour for the students and staff like RO and UV Water cooler, Sanitary Napkin vending machine, Canteen for refreshment, Xerox Center, Girl's Common room, Health room, Sports room, Gymnasium. The Institution has installed CGRT Solar PV 10 Kv. In the current year as a renewable energy source to meet total power requirement and excess energy supplied to the grid.

4.1.2 The institution has adequate facilities for sports, games (indoor, outdoor) gymnasium, yoga centre etc. and cultural activities

Response:

The Management believes in the all-round development of students, therefore it has provided a well maintained campus spread over 1.63 acres of serene green land excluding built up area. There is a lots of encouragement for the students to participate in sports and cultural activities simultaneously and thus they are awarded and rewarded accordingly.

Games and Sports:

The institution emphasize on all round development of the students, hence it takes special interest in providing facilities for Sports and Games, Cultural and extracurricular activities. Some of the facilities are.

- The college encourages participation of the students in various sports activities and provides monetary assistance as well as necessary kits.
- The outdoor games such as ball badminton, shuttle badminton, volley ball, football practice ground, kabaddi, kho-kho, athletics, etc., are as per the standard specifications and size and are well practiced and played by the students.
- The college has cricket practice pitch.
- Indoor games such as wrestling, chess, carom, Taekwondo, Judo etc. are being played by the students at present.
- The college has a gymnasium as a fitness center and workstation.
- The college has constituted health centre which organizes various health related activities, awareness programs including yoga. The Institution has appointed a doctor for regular medical check-up for the students and staff.
- The Institution has signed MoU with Shri Babasahed Gharphalkar College of Physical Education in order to share sports ground such as 400 meter running track, Cricket Ground.

College teams are formed to take part in National level, State level and University level competitions and other intercollegiate competitions. Every year the sports week is celebrated in January month. Sports event competitions are conducted in the interdepartmental level in an academic year and the winners are awarded and rewarded accordingly.

Cultural Activities:

Institute has a large Cultural hall/Seminar hall with seating capacity of more than 500 students. It is provided with e-classroom equipped with LCD Projector, audio system and internet facilities. All the cultural activities in the Institution are conducted under the banner of '*Abhinav Kala Manch*'. Students are very much encouraged to participate in the various cultural events and competitions held in the college like freshers day, debate, elocution, mehandi competition, dish decoration, salad decoration, flower arrangement, rangoli competition, poster competition, slogan competition, Anand Mela, Farewell etc.

Apart from these, the Institution also conducts national level inter collegiate photography competition on wildlife, inter collegiate debate competition, inter school drawing competition, inter collegiate essay competition to exhibit cultural talents. Students are even sent to other colleges for various inter collegiate competitions.

Laboratory

ICT facilities in the institution including computers and other electronic gadgets are well maintained through Annual Maintenance Contract.

Campus and Building Maintenance

The institutional campus is well maintained through daily wages workers. Botanical garden and trees in the premises are well maintained through daily wages gardeners. In order to maintain campus hygienic one sweeper is appointed on daily wages. The building maintenance is looked after by the Principal and faculties. For this purpose the budget is allocated every year. Round the clock security guards take care of the campus besides CCTV cameras have been installed for the monitoring.

For maintenance of campus services of carpenters, plumbers, electricians, welders, lobour for civil construction and other technicians are used as and when required.

6.2.4 Effectiveness of various bodies/cells/committees is evident through minutes of meetings and implementation of their resolutions

• An example of activity successfully implemented based on the minutes of the meeting:

The Institution has felt it necessary that the research can only generate the new ideas, new thinking on scientific basis which ultimately support the nation for its progress which is beneficial to the society at large. The faculties, research scholars and students should acquire the knowledge of basic research technics and its scientific analysis to come to the conclusion.

Knowing the fact that recently the UGC has changed the rules, regulations and norms for the research methodology and research articles to be published only in the list recommended by the UGC. The main objectives of these changes are to stop or at least to minimize the plagiarism in research work. Further the UGC is aiming to improve the quality of research work in our country.

In consideration with these facts the IQAC in its regular meeting held on 22/02/2017 kept an agenda for the next meeting to conduct One Day National Workshop on 'Research Methodology & Research Journal Recommended by UGC' to be held on last week of March, 2017. Accordingly in the next meeting the same was discussed, prepared work plan and assigned responsibilities to the faculties for the successful conduction of workshop.

Research tries to find out the solution of the problem with some analytical view. All this process goes through the research but those who are newly interested in research has some lacking about the technical aspects of the research. Besides there are different aspects like research methods, various research bulletin and their quality. It has been observed that researchers are lacking in proper scientific information. For this purpose the IQAC has taken a significant initiative to organize a workshop for detail guidance to the research scholars, supervisors, students and teacher.

As a result of minutes of the meeting and implementation of its resolution Institution organized One Day National Workshop on '**Research Methodology & Research Journal Recommended by UGC**' on 30/03/2017. At this event in the presence of dignitaries Research Proceedings was released which contained research articles submitted by number of delegates and research scholars. The chief Speakers explained in detail the importance and effectiveness of title, delegates and research scholars from various districts like Thane, Aurangabad, Jalna, Beed, Nanded, Nagpur, Yevatmal, Wardha were present in large numbers.

6.3.5 Institution has Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

The purchasing process is initiated by purchase committee which includes all head of departments and account office, accordingly the quotations called and after the negotiations purchase orders are placed. The payments is released after delivery of the respective goods it is done as per the terms and conditions mentioned in purchase order. All transaction has transparency through bills and vouchers. The bill payments are passed after testing and verification of items. Financial audit is conducted by external agency.

waste management.

• Liquid waste management:

The institutional laboratories generate minimal liquid waste. However, liquid waste and treated water minimal generated through laboratories properly neutralized through the use of lime in liquid waste management tanks created at an outlet into a less harm liquid form. Expired and unused chemicals are properly disposed through ditch. Green approach is followed for the uses and handling of chemicals so that lesson the adverse effect on environment and to create eco-friendly atmosphere.

• E-waste Management:

The institution generate minimal E-waste however, it makes proper management of the E-waste generated. All the students and staff are informed not to throw away electronic and similar waste items in the institutional campus. UPS batteries are recharged, repaired and exchanged by the supplier.

- Extra and Co-curriculum Activities

The practice adopted by the institution has given good results in allowing students to mould themselves for becoming responsible citizens and excel in area worked out.

The main objective before adopting this practice is to enhance teacher quality in terms of their qualification, characteristics, professional development and recognition of teaching abilities as per the demanding situation.

3. The Context:

The institution has had a little research activities before first accreditation, but after establishment of IQAC and as per NAAC suggestions the institution has given prime importance to Research Activities and Professional Development.

4. The Practice:

The IQAC has created research acumen in the institution which has successfully reflected through various research outputs with clear records such as doctoral, research scholars, projects and number of research publications beneficial both for the faculties as well as students. 7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Describe/Explain the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust

Response:

Adoption of Nachangaon Village by the Institution

The institution owing its liability to the society and environment has initiated collaborative activity in the year 2014-15 for the cleanliness and beautification of Nachagaon lake (*Singada Talav*) with Gram Panchayat, Nachangaon and Villagers. The IQAC along with its members made a survey of the lake,

prepared an action plan and has had lot of paper works and correspondence for the same with local people, Sarpanch, Tahsildar, SDO, MLA, MP, members of various Government bodies and social organizations for the prescribed activity. In pursuance the institution came to know that this activity has been already covered under MGNREGA Scheme.

Subsequently it has been specifically mentioned by IQAC as weakness in SWOT analysis of 2015-16 AQAR. It has demoralizing effect on IQAC and to overcome this it has started afresh activity as strength in the same year as adoption of Nachangaon village by way carrying cleanliness activities in the village, collection of floral wastage, assisting old age home, deaf and dumb school, and anganwadi by way of providing food, fruits, grains, unused medicines, cloths and uniforms. The institution and IQAC motivated various departments and faculties to initiate such activities, which has been resulted positively as follows:

The institution conducts cleanliness programmes at various places in the village, at the same time creates awareness through rallies, street act and display of flex boards. Especially in the Ganesh and Durga festivals Floral wastage (*nirmalya*) is collected by the students of NSS, such wastage *nirmalya* is used for lab to land project *Nirmalya* to Fertilizer & Vermi Compost Project. It has been helpful to the Botanical Garden of the Institution itself and sold to local farmers.

Cleanliness drive at Historical Sarai and *Siddheshwa*r temple is carried out by History department of institution in collaboration with Nachangaon Gram Panchayat & Lions Club Pulgaon Bridgetown at the hands of Raja Mudhoji Bhosale, Nagpur (13th heir of Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj). Awareness about these historical places also created among the villagers.

Departments of Home Economics, Fashion Designing, Botany, Commerce with NSS initiated charitable work at late Shahbanubai Hirani old age home for women, late Rajiv Gandhi deaf and dumb school and Anganwadi in Nachangaon by way of providing food, fruits, grain, unused medicines, uniforms, quilts, clothes etc.

The institutional distinctiveness thus, reflects through its performance in this area which is also associated with its vision and priority.

5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information :

The institution striving to maintain the decorum, judging itself by the seven criteria set by NAAC for the second time is an insightful journey which helped us to put ourselves in right perspective. As per the suggestions of NAAC Peer Team during the first cycle, we have tried our level best to implement the suggestions given by the team.

It has been continuously trying to excel in Academic, Co-curricular, Extracurricular, Games and Sports arena. Apart from this the faculties are associated with social activities which reflect through the overall performance of its students. At the same time environmental awareness also created among the students, though the institution is situated in rural area and having environmental ecofriendly campus, it always strive to create more awareness about environment through Green Waves Natures Club.

Ours is the area known for most of the suicidal incidents among the local farmers, in this regards, the institution has had many initiative to create awareness among the farmers by way of workshops, conferences and guidance to local farmers in recent changes in cultivation. Institutional

Central Lab and departments also facilitate the soil and water testing facilities to the local farmers.

The Institution understanding the fact that development is a continuous and unending process, putting its best efforts for the same. It is also trying to meet the quality parameters as per the demands of changing time. In the light of this truth RAR has been prepared.
